Dear Healthcare Provider:

The American College of Healthcare Architects (ACHA) is an accreditation body made up of experienced healthcare architects. Only highly qualified individuals who pass a rigorous exam, demonstrate their level of expertise through a portfolio of their work and meet a high standard of continuing education requirements can achieve ACHA certification. Growing stronger every year, we currently have more than 480 certificate holders in 47 of the United States, as well as Canada. Our average certificate holder has 28 years of experience, spends 90% of his or her time in healthcare, speaks at conferences (average of 9 times), is published (average of 4.5 times), and earns significantly more CEUs a year than required. You’ve probably worked with one of us.

If you are a healthcare provider involved with healthcare planning and construction projects, you will want an ACHA-certified architect on your team. Engaging an ACHA-certified architect, or hiring a firm that assigns an ACHA-certified professional to your project, confers the following benefits:
